It's been a while since the last newsletter and there's a lot of good news.

Let's start with money! We've received a donation of £10,000 from the Moondance Foundation and a grant of £20,000 from the Garfield Weston Foundation, plus a further £5000 from our Town Council. These sums mean that – drum roll! – we've reached our magic total of £150,000 for the adaption building work! This is such a huge success (and relief!) for us, and we are so grateful to our small but fantastic funding sub-group who have worked incredibly hard on numerous applications, and been successful in almost all of them. There is one more application outcome still awaited, which would give us a nice comfy cushion on the building works budget.

The focus of our fundraising efforts is now switching to the Hub operation and activities. We already have £5000 in the bank towards the cost of the kitchen, thanks to the Community Foundation Wales (from the Welsh Church Act Fund). And other specific items, including clock restoration, hearing loop system, specialist lighting and sound systems, are being identified so that possible funding sources can be found.

More good news - about the building works. Construction work on the Hub is now gathering pace. The pipework for the water and sewage services has been laid between the building and the Lych Gate, all under the close supervision of the necessary archaeological monitoring. The connections to the mains services are due to be made by Welsh Water during May. Inside, the foundation work for the new floor is underway and the internal drainage runs for the WC and kitchen are being put in place. The build project continues to be the responsibility of the Steering Group whose role will continue until completion of the adaption work which we hope will be in the autumn. The Steering Group members are all Norton residents - Maggie James, John Wilding, Tony Morgan, Brian Price and John Refausse. And even more good news - looking ahead to the opening of the Hub at the end of the year (impossible to type that without a thrill of excitement!). A Management Committee has been formed to take responsibility for operating the Hub when it is ready for community use. The Committee is currently working closely with the Steering Group to ensure that the appropriate policies and practices are in place in time for the Hub opening. These include financial controls, planning Hub-based activities, agreeing relevant policies such as safeguarding, identifying equipment and furniture needs, and planning local fundraising. The Management Committee members are also all Norton residents - Catherine O'Rourke, Andre Vanhuls, David Rowing, Chris Ruby, Elizabeth Stone, Chris Refausse, Martin Brockington, Tracey McAdam, Steve Foster, Dick Sawle and Elizabeth Preston, with John Refausse acting as interim chair. Again, please do feel free to ask any questions.

And so, of course, with funding still very much in mind, we hope you'll support these upcoming village events:

Norton Open Gardens - Saturday 27 and Sunday 28 May. Tickets will cost £10 per head for entry to all 12 participating gardens and include a cream tea at Corte Cottage.
